By The Numbers



9 million LGBT in US

2013 National Health Interview Study, Gallup Survey

- 3.5%-4.5% of population self reported LGBTQ
- 0.3% identify as transgender

Skew to a younger age (37.3 vs 47.9 years)

• 9.1% among Millenials, 15.9% Gen Z)

Slightly more female

8% report same sex behavior

Core Vocabulary



Sexual orientation

- Gay, straight, homosexual, heterosexual, MSM, Queer
- Label not as important as practice

Gender identity

Transgender: pt different gender than assigned at birth (transwoman, transman, trans, transgender, transition)

Cisgender: pt same gender as assigned at birth

Health Disparity: Risks

- Increased smoking
- Increased drug use
- Inconsistent condom use
- Weight control behaviors
- Overweight (2x)
- Less physical activity
- 43% physical abuse

- Depression, anxiety
- Suicide attempts (4x)
- Asthma
- Cardiovascular disease
- STI's
- Cancer risk
- Homelessness

Cancer Risks



Risks based on current anatomy, biology

Patient may not relate with anatomy

Incomplete transition

Trans men: cervical, ovarian, breast cancer

Trans women: prostate cancer

Tailored messaging, education



Prostate Cancer



Lower screening rates

Unknown increased risk:

• Use of steroids, Testosterone, HIV status and antiretroviral therapy, fatty diet

Similar outcomes, different social and lifestyle needs during and after treatment

May have more post treatment complications

Benefit from interdisciplinary team

No change in screening: DRE and/or PSA, age 55+

Melanoma



Higher rates indoor and outdoor tanning

Higher cancer rates (1.1 MSM vs 0.6% lifetime risk)

Encourage screening

Encourage sunscreen



Manash 2015 Marks 2020

Colon Cancer



No data on differential outcomes or prevalence

Higher rates of colonoscopy screening

Standard guidelines: begin at age 45

Anal Cancer



HPV related

• 15% MSW infected, 60% MSM infected, 90 % HIV MSM

Risk increases with number sexual partners, HIV, MSM

Anal Pap



Anal Dysplasia



Spanc Trial

- 600 MSM followed
 - HSIL seen in 46% of HIV+ MSM, 32% HIV- MSM
 - No cancer

Anchor Trial

- 4459 PLWH with HSIL: RCT treatment vs monitor
 - Incidence for progression to cancer at 48 mos was 1.8%
 - Treatment reduced rate of cancer progression by 57% (0.9 vs 1.8%)
 - Screen: Immunocompromised annually, Immunocompetent biennially



History Taking



Are you sexually active? Explore what that means to patient

Do you practice safer sex? Explore what this means to the patient.

Identify support, relationships

Establish pronouns

Patient may not associate with labels

Organ inventory



SGM Representation in Cancer Clinical Trials


764 trials reviewed between 1991 and 2017

NONE reported SGM or LGBTQ+ status

20% COOP trials collect sexual orientation data10% collect gender identity data

Providers: LGBTQ Cultural Competence

I actively inquire about a patient's sexual orientation when taking a history.



NCCN Panels Survey

- 84% sexual orientation irrelevant
- 94% gender identity irrelevant



Cancer Early Detection



Lower rates of health insurance among LGBT

Lower utilization of health care by LB women
Lower Pap testing by LB women
Among women difference in colonoscopy
Inconclusive data on mammography among LB women

No current guidelines for HPV testing for GB men Suggestive evidence that colonoscopy is higher among GB men

No data on T

HIV



MSM, trans should be screened annually

Consider PrEP, Truvada

Early education

HIV rates increasing

Youth 13-24 yo accounted for 22% of all infections in 2015

• Gay and bisexual men 81% of those
